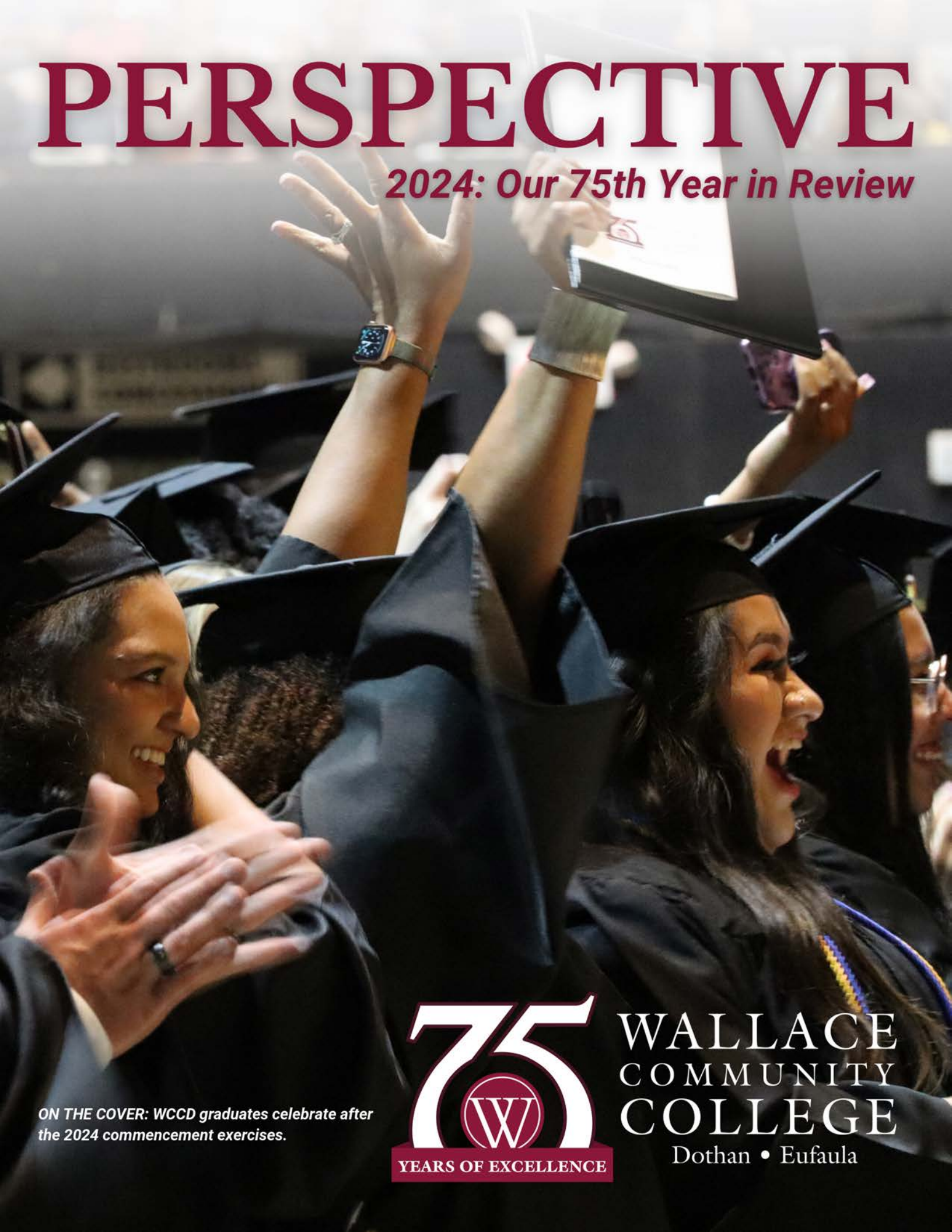

Dr. Linda C. Young Retires After 36 Years of Leadership

Dr. Linda C. Young, President of Wallace Community College-Dothan (WCCD), announced her retirement effective October 1, 2024, concluding a remarkable 36-year tenure as its president. Dr. Young, who made history as the first female president of a technical college in Alabama, reflected on her journey, emphasizing the collective achievements of the college community. "What we have accomplished together is largely because we all have one goal in mind—helping our students fulfill their dreams," she shared.

Dr. Young's retirement was met with accolades from state leaders. Governor Kay Ivey praised her trailblazing contributions to Alabama's community college system, particularly in healthcare and nursing education, which have significantly benefited the state. Jimmy H. Baker, Chancellor of the Alabama Community College System, highlighted her transformative impact on workforce development and her commitment to serving diverse communities. Both leaders acknowledged her legacy as a pioneer and advocate for education and community service.

Dr. Young's leadership began at Sparks State Technical College in 1988. Following the merger of Sparks with WCCD in 1999, she led the newly unified institution, fostering innovation in adult education, workforce development, and student success. Her initiatives for adult women's education received national recognition, and her legislative advocacy paved the way for programs supporting displaced homemakers. Throughout her tenure, WCCD earned numerous accolades, including the American Association of Community Colleges Award of Excellence for Student Success.

Beyond her professional accomplishments, Dr. Young has been an active community leader, serving in organizations like the Dothan Area Chamber of Commerce and Leadership Alabama. Her academic journey began at Enterprise State Junior College, followed by degrees from Troy University and a doctorate from Auburn University. Recognized with awards such as the Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction and inclusion in the Dothan Area Chamber Business Hall of Fame, Dr. Young leaves behind a legacy of dedication, innovation, and profound impact on Alabama's educational landscape.

Keith Phillips Appointed WCCD Interim President

Phillips currently serves as Executive Director of the Alabama Technology Network (ATN) and Vice Chancellor of Workforce and Economic Development.

Phillips will serve following the retirement of Dr. Linda Young, who served as president of the College for 36 years. Young’s retirement was approved by the Alabama Community College System Board of Trustees on September 11, 2024.

He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Agribusiness Education from Auburn University and an associate degree in Science from Wallace Community College.



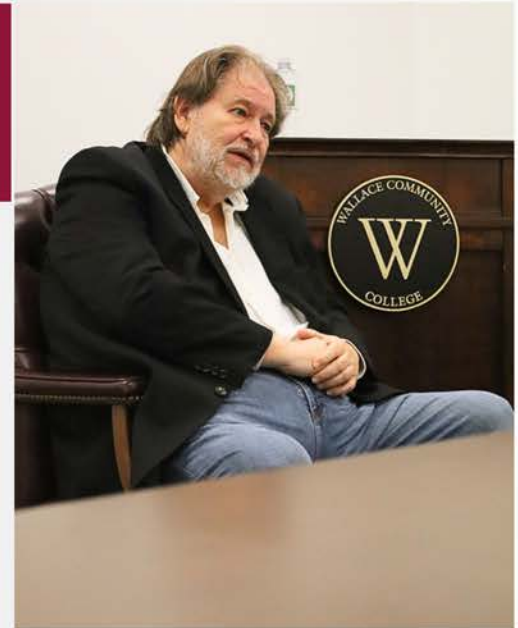

WCCD Awarded \$2.9 Million Grant to Establish Wiregrass Center for Rural Healthcare Opportunities at Dale Medical Center

Wallace Community College-Dothan (WCCD) has been awarded a \$2.9 million grant from the Alabama Community College System (ACCS) as part of the Alabama Centers for Rural Healthcare Opportunity legislative appropriation. This grant will facilitate the establishment of the Wiregrass Center for Rural Healthcare Opportunities on the campus of Dale Medical Center in Ozark, Alabama.

The Wiregrass Center for Rural Healthcare Opportunities (the Center) is poised to make a significant impact in the Dale County area by serving as a career and workforce development hub for the high-demand healthcare professions of licensed practical nurse (LPN) and mental health technician (MHT), moving students from the earliest stages of healthcare career exploration through completion of a healthcare training program, successful certification/licensure to work in-field, and on to successful employment with a local rural healthcare employer.

The Center is a community-wide collaboration between the College, multiple healthcare providers, multiple high schools, local government, and local and regional workforce/economic developers.

"Every healthcare provider in our region has depended on Wallace Community College to train our workforce over the years," said Vernon Johnson, Dale Medical Center Chief Executive Officer. "When we had the opportunity to join forces with Wallace Community College to provide an on-site training program for Nurses and Certified Mental Health Technicians, we jumped at this opportunity. Through this joint effort between WCCD and DMC, we are expanding our existing partnership of developing and training a healthcare workforce that will benefit not only DMC but the entire Wiregrass region."

The Center will focus on alleviating shortages of licensed practical nurses, nursing assistants, and mental health technicians currently in high demand in the greater Dale County area. WCCD intends to offer its Practical Nursing (PN) program and the Mental Health Technician (MHT) program at the Center. Coursework that prepares students for the Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) credential is embedded in both the PN and MHT curriculum and enables students to begin working in the healthcare field before graduation. The College will work directly with partner healthcare providers to match students up-front with employer sponsors for scholarships, internships, and job offers.

"Creating a base of instruction at Dale Medical Center will allow us to reach even more residents in nearby communities, as well as high school students in the Dale County area, with educational opportunities that will allow them to join us in our mission," said Kathy Buntin, WCCD Associate Dean of Health Sciences. "We look forward to working with potential health sciences students and our healthcare partners in this venture."

CTE Receives New Tech Grants, Establishes State's First Electrical Apprenticeship

Wallace Community College-Dothan (WCCD) has received two major workforce development grants from the Alabama Community College System (ACCS), totaling over \$716,000, to enhance its advanced manufacturing and information technology programs. A \$336,369 grant will fund a Modular Production System (MPS) for the Industrial Systems Technology and FAME programs, offering students hands-on experience with robotics, automation, and mechatronics. A \$380,266 grant will establish the "Cyber Range and Beyond" platform in the Computer Information Sciences program, providing immersive training in cybersecurity, cyber defense, and network management. Additionally, WCCD, in collaboration with Advantage Consulting & Solutions and ACCS, has announced the launch of the Alabama Cyber Security Fellowship Program, aimed at providing students with real-world cybersecurity training and career opportunities.

These initiatives prepare students for high-demand careers across various sectors, including manufacturing roles like industrial machinery mechanics and IT fields such as cybersecurity specialists and network administrators. The fellowship program will further address workforce needs by offering selected students from three colleges a 16-week course combining hands-on labs and paid on-the-job training with industry partners. Supported by regional collaborations, these programs aim to equip students with critical skills, fostering a workforce ready to meet Alabama's evolving economic demands.

WCCD, Diamond -R- Electric Partner to Create Alabama's First Electrical Apprenticeship

Wallace Community College-Dothan (WCCD), in collaboration with Diamond-R-Electric, has launched Alabama's first state-recognized Electrician Apprenticeship program. Approved by the Alabama Electrician Board, the program grants apprentices 2,000 of the 8,000 hours required for journeyman certification. Announced at the Dothan Area Chamber of Commerce's State of the Workforce event, this initiative underscores the critical role of partnerships between educational institutions and local businesses in developing skilled, workforce-ready professionals.

WCCD Associate Dean Martha Compton praised the program's innovative approach, emphasizing its potential to enhance students' career prospects through hands-on training. Rob Rhoades of Diamond-R-Electric highlighted the program as a transformative effort to invest in the Wiregrass region's workforce. With strong support from state representatives and the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, the program is set to create a skilled labor pipeline, fostering economic growth in the community.

WCCD Partners with Local High Schools to Provide Free Career Training

The Wallace Community College-Dothan (WCCD) Workforce Development division has partnered with Wiregrass area high schools to provide free career training programs through the Alabama Community College System Skills for Success initiative. These courses are designed to meet Alabama's career readiness requirements for graduation while offering high school students career exploration opportunities. The hybrid training model combines online theoretical instruction with hands-on lab experiences either at the high schools or WCCD campuses.

Through this partnership, students gain essential skills and industry-recognized certifications to succeed in high-demand fields through high-quality, industry-aligned training. Training programs offered include Fiber Optic, Skid Steer, Bulldozer, Excavator, Asphalt Roller, Carpentry Helper, Electrical Helper, Mental Health Worker, and Forklift.

High schools benefitting from this free training in 2024 include Houston County Career Academy, Rehobeth High School, Wicksburg High School, Houston County High School, Ashford High School, Cottonwood High School, Dothan Tech, Headland High School, Eufaula High School, Barbour County High School, Bullock County High School, Ariton High School, GW Long High School, Abbeville High School, Bridge Academy and Dale County High School.
